

SYNOPSIS



Born on a pool table in his grandfather's bar, Charlie Hope is a 12-year-old boy coming of age in 1960s rural Oklahoma. He is a lost boy. Born into a family of secrets and shame, Charlie is both desperate for attention and praying not to be noticed, for fear his own secrets and shame will be exposed. As he struggles to fit in, his mother, Ida, is lost in a different way, retreating into religion as a defense against her shame, and against the tragic secret she fears may be discovered. Like the animals boiled down in the processing plant of the title, Charlie feels rendered into nothingness. Charlie's 17-year-old self watches as young Charlie struggles with his isolation and the realization that he is having sexual feelings towards boys.

In time, Charlie, now 17, meets Dewar, an orphan, equally alone as he longs to flee a brutal and heartless institution. The two boys form a tentative, then intimate relationship. Charlie thinks that he has found love...until Dewar vanishes.

It is only then that Charlie begins to heal, to accept himself, to seek—and give—forgiveness, and, with help and love, resolves his past with Ida. Unsure but finally hopeful, Charlie finds his truth and moves into a life that is all his own.

Pryor Rendering explores the thorny relationships between being LGBTQ, family, and religion. LGBTQ teens still face endless difficulties becoming their authentic selves. Quite often this is complicated by familial relationships with faith and worship. *Pryor Rendering* tells the story of a family who refused to give up on one another, even when their paths

seem irreparably divergent from one another. This is a story for all audiences. *Pryor Rendering* is about first love, family, acceptance and the discovery that one is not alone.

Charlie's tale has a universality that resonates with audiences of all ages. It holds a special meaning to anyone who has ever felt persecuted by faith in childhood. *Pryor Rendering* touches the hearts of those who are searching for who they are. Despite the

gritty setting in rural Oklahoma in the 1960s, the book and lyrics are poetic, and this artistry is part of the emotional impact of this simple but deeply human show.

The cast includes 7 men and 4 women. Some roles are doubled. It features Charlie at ages 12 and 17, his mother Ida, and Dewar, the 17-year old boy who awakens Charlie's heart. Supporting roles include Chick, Charlie's grandfather, and various characters who fill out the world of Pryor and the other locations. This musical is intended to be performed in two acts on a minimal set with lighting and projections signifying time and place; the music can be presented simply with 5 or more musicians.

WORLD PREMIERE

A world premiere production of Pryor Rendering ran from September 30 to October 16, 2016 at Oklahoma City Repertory Theatre in Oklahoma City, OK and at American Theatre Company in Tulsa, OK.

For Stamford Theatre Works in Connecticut, he co-created (with arranger David Bishop), the *Great American Composer Series*, a series of retrospectives/revues honoring America's classic songwriters. They are performed in regional theatres all over the country.

He wrote the libretto for *Storyville*, a 2004 Eugene O'Neill Music Theatre Conference participant. Currently performing for the Tulsa Opera, Shawn wrote the libretto for a family opera, *Twice Upon a Birthday* with composer Frank Schiro, and is currently librettist for a new musical *Pryor Rendering*, also with Mr. Schiro.

Shawn is Associate Professor of Performance at the University of Oklahoma School of Musical Theatre. He is a member of the Society of Directors and Choreographers, Actors Equity, and the Dramatist Guild. He also serves as an Associate Artist and Board Member of Oklahoma City Repertory Theatre (City Rep) and on the Board of Music Theatre Educators Association.
